- •Higher standards of expectation to end family homelessness (HEARTH Act & Opening Doors Federal Strategic Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness)
- Use of technology to capture data (HMIS)
- Limited Resources (budget cuts, capacity)

Rapid Re-housing (RRH), Emergency Shelter and Transitional Housing models

#### System Change: Identified Outcomes of Rapid Re-housing Pilot Project to measure

Rapid Re-housing will decease the amount of time that families are homeless

Rapid Re-housing will increase housing stability for families who experience homelessness

Rapid Re-housing will be more cost effective than emergency shelter and transitional housing






### Outcome 1: Rapid Re-housing will reduce the length of time families are homeless


Average Length of Stay in Emergency Shelter


34% decrease in Emergency shelter LOS

- Monthly meetings with HMIS Lead and Software Vendor

#### What We Do

- 3. Use data to develop strategies for changing the homeless delivery system
  - CoC reallocated transitional housing funding to RRH
  - Coordinate and leverage multiple funding sources (ex., CoC, ESG, CDBG, TANF and County funds)
