THE 2016 AWARDEES

Mercer County, NJ

Finding homes for children and families is something Mercer County, NJ takes to heart. Over the past five years, the county has successfully decreased child and family homelessness by 61 percent. This success started in 2008 when they transformed their family homelessness system and started using rapid re-housing as a solution to end homelessness.

Flagler Housing & Homeless Services, St. Joseph's Villa - Richmond, VA

Family and child homelessness decreased 30 percent between 2010 and 2015 in Richmond, due in part to the work of Flagler Housing and Homeless Services. Beginning in 2013, St. Joseph's Villa began turning its transitional housing services into rapid re-housing programs, with much success. In 2015 Flagler's rapid re-housing program won the Virginia Housing Award for Best Housing Program.

Will Evans, VP of Housing, Community Connections - Jacksonville, FL

Every so often there is a voice in the community, a champion, who leads the charge for change. Will Evans has been that voice for homeless children and families in Jacksonville, FL for nearly two decades. Over the past five years, Mr. Evans has seen child and family homelessness decrease by nearly 40 percent in his community. Mr. Evans approaches issues with a non-profit heart, but a business head and enjoys negotiating and structuring transactions and programs.
