HEARTH AND COC INTERIM RULE BASICS

- HEARTH act was enacted May 20, 2009
- First significant reauthorization of HUD's McKinney–Vento Homeless
 Assistance programs since 1992
- Changed the Emergency Shelter Grant into the Emergency Solutions
 Grant
- Formally established the Continuum of Care Program
- CoC Interim Rule was first published July 31, 2012



October 29, 2012 Hurricane Sandy hit New Jersey

- Three programs were merged to formalize the Continuum of Care program
- CoC was required to:
 - Develop bylaws, funding policies and procedures and written standards
 - Establish a board to act on behalf of the CoC

2 423 CoCs Nationally 386 CoCs Nationally 16 CoCs in NJ



Funding was provided to support the structure and process requirements of the Continuum of Care

NJ CoC's received \$59,276 in planning grant funding

NJ CoCs received \$2,019,080 in planning grant funding

Requirement to establish and operate a centralized or coordinated assessment system that provides an initialcomprehensive assessment of the needs of individuals and families for housing and services.

24% of households discharged from ES or TH went to PH 22% of households served in PSH were chronically homeless

10% of households served in PH were experiencing unsheltered homelessness prior to program admission

2012

Update to the definition of chronically homeless

Implementation and priority for Housing First programs

2022

36% of households discharged from ES or TH went to PH 39% of households served in PSH were chronically homeless 20% of households served in PH were experiencing unsheltered homelessness prior to program admission

Increased emphasis on permanent housing and specifically the use of rapid rehousing

CHANGE SEEN IN NJ COC FUNDING

NJ received \$27,757,829 in Continuum of Care Funds

NJ received \$54,689,915 in Continuum of Care Funds

OTHER CHANGES

- Shifting from program outlook to a system outlook
- Incorporating and enhancing input from persons with lived experience
- Cross funding stream program evaluation and funding processes
- Evaluating the system from a racial equity lens
- Shift to a strong data focus

- Use data and evidence to make decisions
- Enhanced collaboration with regular partners as well as non-traditional partners
- Increase housing resources
