# **IMPORTANT:**

NJ HMIS is the cornerstone of a data-driven strategy to end homelessness in New Jersey.

This being said, to get where we need to go, NJ HMIS cannot be the sole tool by which that end state is achieved.

### Overcoming Bad Habits – Change Behaviors in Data-Driven Homelessness Policy

**Cherry-picking**: Officials may selectively use data that supports their predetermined views while ignoring contradictory information.

**Lack of context:** Data might be presented without important contextual factors, leading to misinterpretation.

Outdated information: Relying on old data that doesn't reflect current realities.

Oversimplification: Complex issues are reduced to a few data points, missing nuances.

**Misunderstanding statistical significance:** Drawing sweeping conclusions from limited or non-representative samples.

Confusing correlation with causation: Assuming a causal relationship where only correlation exists.

**Insufficient data literacy:** Decision-makers may lack the skills to properly interpret complex datasets.

Political pressure: Data may be manipulated or interpreted to align with political agendas.

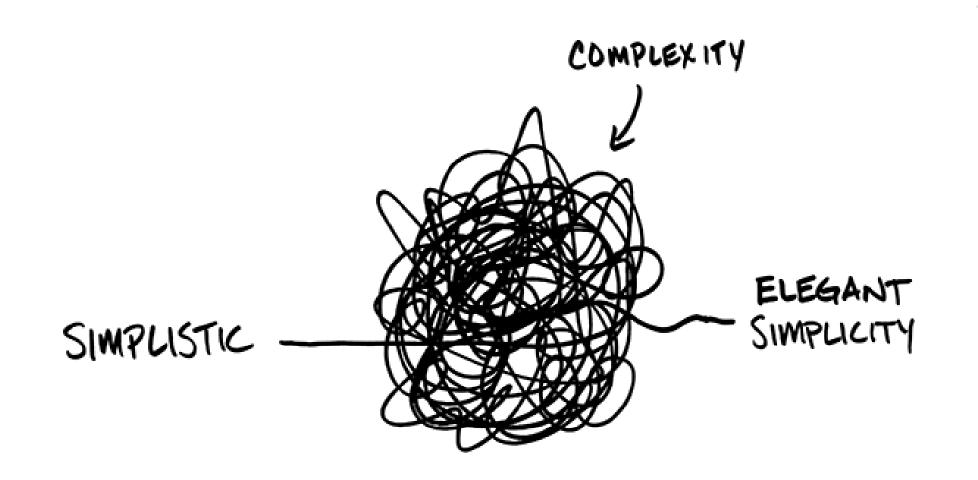


### Level Setting – Change Behaviors in Data-Driven Homelessness Policy

- Checkbox mentality: Compliance-focused data collection often leads to a "checkbox mentality" where the goal is simply to meet regulatory requirements rather than gain meaningful insights. This can result in:
  - Superficial data collection that lacks depth or nuance
  - Missed opportunities to gather more valuable, policy-relevant information
  - A false sense of security that issues are being adequately addressed
- Misaligned incentives: When data is collected primarily for compliance, there may be incentives to:
  - Underreport negative outcomes
  - Overemphasize positive metrics
  - Manipulate data to meet minimum thresholds
- Narrow focus: Compliance data often focuses on specific, mandated metrics, which can lead to:
  - Neglect of other important factors not covered by compliance requirements
  - A skewed understanding of complex issues
  - Policy decisions that optimize for compliance rather than actual outcomes
- Data silos: Compliance data is often collected and stored separately from other operational data, resulting in:
  - Fragmented information landscapes
  - Difficulty in connecting compliance data with other relevant datasets
  - Missed opportunities for more comprehensive analysis



# HMIS is a tool, not a platform.



We need to let HMIS be an HMIS, and not an everything for every use-case.



### Problems to Tackle – Change Behaviors in Data-Driven Homelessness Policy

### **Data for action demands:**

- Collaboration and Shared Ownership
- Accessibility and Useability
- Outcome-Oriented Analysis
- Action-Oriented Reporting
- Acceptance of failure and risk tolerance

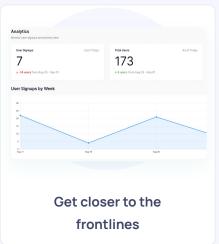
### An "ecosystem approach" to data analysis & integration

Roundtable's ecosystem gives partners more capacity, voice and shared commitment through ongoing interactions with their CoCs, the state and with each other







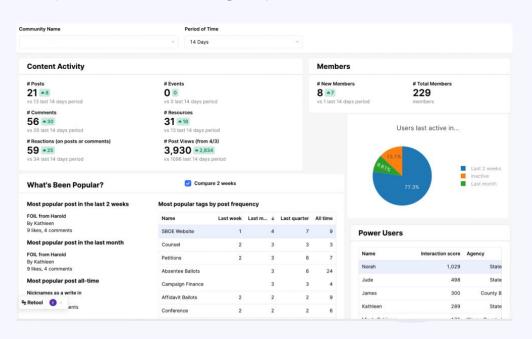


Our ecosystem will begin with grantees and evolve to include policymakers, TA providers, and partners

#### Measure performance

- Active users DAU / WAU / MAU
- Activity metrics posts, likes, comments, events, resources, response rates

#### Identify trends

- Power users
- Trending tags
- Popular posts
- Dips / spikes in engagement

#### Suggest content - action

- Unanswered popular searches
- Unanswered questions
- Topic suggestions based on recent trending activity
